#### **GENERAL INFORMATION**

#### <u>Measles</u>

The Ministry of Education has sent us a reminder about the increased risk of measles around the Waikato and have provided the attached fact sheet as a source of information.

#### Junior Speeches

Year 1 - 4 children are working on speech writing and delivery in class. Year 1 students are learning to recite a nursery rhyme. Years 2 - 4 students are writing a persuasive speech. During Week 3, 5<sup>th</sup> - 9<sup>th</sup> August, the children will be presenting their speeches to their classes. By Monday 12th August, finalists from each year group will be notified. The Junior Speech Competition will be held on Wednesday 14<sup>th</sup> August at 9.15 a.m. in the multipurpose room. Parents and whānau are welcome to this event.

#### Senior Speeches

Year 5 – 8 children are working on speech writing and delivery in class. We have an open category, therefore students are able to choose from entertaining, informative or persuasive topics. Our speeches need to be between 3:00 – 3:30 minutes long and are rated on content and delivery. During Week 3,  $5^{th} – 9^{th}$  August, the children will be presenting their speeches to their classes. The finalists from each year group will be progressing to the Senior Speech Competition to be held in our multipurpose room on Thursday 15<sup>th</sup> August, starting at 9.15 a.m. Parents and whānau are welcome to this event.

#### The NED Show

On Tuesday the whole school experienced The NED Show. The NED Show is an innovative character education assembly. The show is based on the adventures of a character called NED which stands for – Never give up, Encourage others and Do your best. The presenter used humour, storytelling, audience participation, yoyo and magic tricks to deliver the NED message.

The show was delivered free to Rotokauri School and now we pay-it-forward for the next school. Yesterday your child/children would have brought home a flyer regarding the purchasing of yoyos, holsters and strings. These are available by completing the order form and coming to the MPR to collect their purchase. Sales will be from  $1^{st} - 14^{th}$  August.

#### New PMP Equipment

The juniors would like to thank the PTA for funding the purchase of the new shapes for PMP. The children in the photo are enjoying climbing through the large shapes. In this activity they learn the name of the shape and what they look like, while developing their locomotive skills. There are also small shapes that can be used for passing beanbags and balls through. Lots of fun and learning.



#### **Medications**

Please ensure that you come to the school office to fill out a medical form if your child requires medication during school hours. If your child needs to use an inhaler please ensure that they are brought to school, named and in a sealed plastic bag. No medications can be administered without written permission. Please do not bring 3 times a day antibiotics to be administered at school – this dosage is manageable at home. Only 4 times a day antibiotics will be given at school if needed.

If medication is held at school please take the time to check expiry dates and how much medication is available throughout the year, so that if needed the medication will work correctly when administered.

If your child has an allergy, is asthmatic or has other medical conditions that require a health plan please let the school office know so that these plans can be completed or updated (as per the Ministry of Health regulations).

#### Photocopy Paper

Thank you to the families who gave photocopy paper to the school at the start of the year. As you can imagine, the school goes through a lot of paper and the start of year supply has almost been used up. If you would like to donate another ream of paper to the school this would be very much appreciated and would help us through the second half of the year. Please bring the named ream to the school office.



Vision Hearing Technicians from Community and Southern Rural Health will be visiting our school. The objective of the test is to identify previously undetected vision and hearing problems.

#### Which children are routinely checked?

- Children who have not completed vision and hearing checks as part of their B4 School Check

- Children absent from previous visit, require rescreens or follow up
- New Immigrants
- Year 7 student's vision only

If there is a genuine hearing concern, parents/caregivers or teachers may request a hearing check - NB parents must consent to this. The Vision Hearing Technician will only be able to undertake a maximum of 5 screens on any visit. If there is a concern regarding vision, parents/caregivers are encouraged to seek advice from an optometrist. A subsidy is available for families/whanau that have a Community Services card or High Use Health card.

#### What tests are carried out?

Ears

- Audiometry (hearing test)

- Tympanometry – middle ear function test (only carried out when hearing test is not within a normal range)

<u>Eyes</u>

Long distance vision tests – not a complete visual examination, but a simple screening test

NB All of these checks are non-invasive, safe and should cause no discomfort.

#### The Vision Hearing Technician will:

- Notify parents/caregivers of all test results
- Enter results on Ministry of Education database (Enrol)

The Vision Hearing Technician will obtain personal details from the school ie; names, date of birth.

If the technician needs to contact parents/caregivers following the visit, addresses and phone numbers will also be required.

Our Service may share this information with other health professionals involved in the children's care.

If any parents/caregivers **do not** want their child to be checked, or their child is currently under specialist care for their vision or hearing, they should let the school know.


