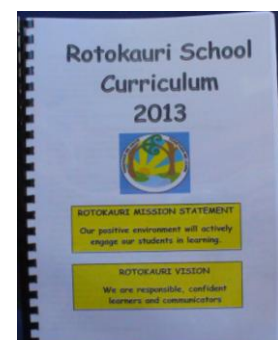

SWIMMING POOL SAFETY

It has come to our attention that there have been incidents this year when our swimming pool rules have not been followed. Please carefully read these responsibilities if you are a key holder.

As a key holder you will need to show some personal responsibility when using the pool.

If you feel you cannot fulfill all of the following, please do not ask for a key.

Key Holder's Responsibilities:

1. No persons under the age of 18 are allowed to be a key holder.
2. No glassware is allowed to be in the pool complex. Alcohol is banned.
3. Never leave children unattended in the pool for any reason.
4. No items in the pool are allowed that will damage the pump system.
5. Do not dive in the pool. The depth is not sufficient to allow for safe diving – especially for adults.
6. No running around the school pool complex.
7. Make sure you lock the pool gate when you have finished.
8. Do not pass your key on for others to use.
9. Do you know resuscitation techniques?
10. Do you have a current first aid certificate?

Most importantly, please note that the Board of Trustees reserves the right to close the pool at any time, or to recall any keys at any time.

MEDICATION POLICY

RATIONALE

Procedures are necessary to administer or supervise medication for students when it is impossible for the parent or caregiver to do so.

PURPOSES

To administer or supervise medication to students prescribed by a GP or Specialist – the first dose not to be given at school during school hours.

GUIDELINES

1. To ensure that all parents / caregivers and staff are aware of this policy by notification in school newsletter. (Send out after each review). Put in school brochure.
2. All requests will be on the "Parent / Caregivers Request for School to Administer /Supervise Medication" form and addressed to the Principal. Prior approval must be sought / given before any medication is administered / supervised. The Medication Agreement to be signed by the parent / caregiver.
3. A register is maintained and will be signed each time medication is administered. It will be the parent / caregiver's responsibility to inform the school of any change in the student's medication and the previous agreement will need to be amended and then signed.
4. It is the parent's responsibility to ensure that medication to be used at school is not past its use by date.
5. The medical practitioner's directions, included on the label of all medicines and on the Medication Agreement, will be followed.
6. Other treatment / medication given on an irregular needs basis are to have details entered in the Register when administered.
7. Senior students may keep their asthma inhalers and self-administer when necessary.
8. Medication of the type referred to in this policy will be stored in the fridge or in a locked cupboard. The key to which will be behind the door. The Medication Agreement will state that the amount of medication to be held at the school is one day / week's supply and it is the parent / caregiver's responsibility to supply the school, on a weekly basis, with the required medication.
9. Students requiring medication will obtain this from Sharon Verstraten at the time required in the first instance. However, if Sharon Verstraten is absent from school, the medication will be administered by the second person nominated by the school - currently Raewyn O'Brien.
10. Medication will be administered / supervised by the delegated person / persons and witnessed by another adult.
11. The person giving the medication will note the time, date and quantity given, and sign in the Medicines Register.
12. If the medication is refused, or not taken this will be noted in the Register and the parent / caregiver contacted.
13. The school reserves the right to ask the parent to administer the medication.

CONCLUSION

Following these guidelines will increase parents' and staff members' awareness of their responsibilities to care appropriately for students needing medication at school.

FIZZY DRINKS

Fizzy drinks contain lots of sugar which is not good for children's teeth. Fizzy drinks also contain no goodness (vitamins, minerals etc) for growing children.

1 can fizzy drink
= 10 tsp sugar
1 600ml bottle fizzy drink
= 16 tsp sugar



ENERGY DRINKS

Energy drinks not only contain a large amount of sugar but they also contain caffeine which can dangerously raise your heart rate. Energy drinks are not recommended for children because of this.

1 x 250ml can (V)
= 7 tsp sugar
1 x 500ml can (Mother)
= 13 tsp sugar



Information sheet on hearing and vision checks in school

Vision Hearing Technicians from Rural and Community Services will be visiting our school.

The objective of the vision is to identify previously undetected hearing and vision defects.

Which children are routinely checked?

- catch up screening for children who have not completed hearing and vision checks as part of their B4 school check
- children absent from previous visit, require re-tests or follow up
- in special circumstances, parents, teachers or others may request a hearing or vision check
- new immigrants

What tests are carried out?

Ears

- audiometry – hearing test
- typanometry – middle ear function test (only carried out when hearing test is not within a normal range)

Eyes

- long distance vision tests – not a complete visual examination, but a simple screening test
- colour vision tests (Year 7 boys only)

NB All these checks are non-invasive, safe and should cause no discomfort.

The Vision Hearing Technician will:

- notify parents of all test results
- enter results on ministry of education data base (ENROL)

The vision hearing technician will obtain personal details from the school i.e names, dates of birth, ethnicity.

If the technician needs to contact parents or caregivers following the visit, addresses and phone numbers will also be required.

Community services may share this information with other health professionals involved in the children's care

If any parent or caregiver does not want their child to be checked, or their child is currently under specialist care for a hearing or vision defect, they should let the technician know by leaving a message with the school

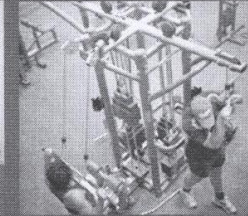
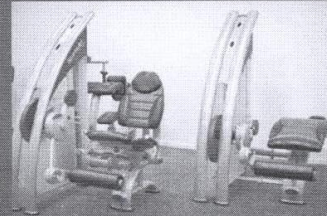
