THREE FACTORS THAT DRIVE STUDENT SUCCESS

New Zealand doesn't do a lot of surveys across the country in terms of education and well-being. We just tend to stick with National Standard data which the government deems as important for reporting on success. Europe and even Australia think a little deeper about what success in children might look like. An example of this, through an Australian Gallop poll, has found that a student's level of hope can be more of an indicative graduation than standardized testing.

The survey involved 11,000 students between the ages of 9 to 16.

48% of the students were hopeful about their future.

59% were engaged with their studies.

63% were thriving in terms of wellbeing.

Engagement, positivity and well-being are better ways of predetermining a child's ability to have a successful life.

Another area that has been well researched overseas is the importance of strong interpersonal relationships between students and staff.

Articles by Brett Henebery on this subject are very well worth a read, as is The Killing of Creativity video (2006 Ted Conference) by Kenneth Robinson.

BULLYING DESCRIPTION

Have you notice how the word bullying is bandied about in social media. If a boss asks a worker to do something that is not in the employee's job description then all of a sudden the word bully is dropped into the conversation.

The Ministry of Education terminology for Bullying is as follows:

"Bullying is a wilful, conscious desire to hurt, threaten or frighten. It can be physical, verbal or psychological in nature and can include racial, religious and sexual harassment, rude gestures, intimidation and extortion. Bullying is ongoing in nature.

At Rotokauri School we have adopted the following description - Bullying is when somebody repeatedly hurts another person by using harmful words and/or actions.

We spend a lot time, within our classes and schoolwide, building positive relationships. It's the thing that we are most proud of at our school - the way that our students work with and treat one another. While I'm writing this I'm watching our students work together on the Agricultural Day activities. When students cooperate, communicate and have a smile on their faces it's a beautiful thing. Not all educational establishments are like this so we can consider ourselves very lucky.

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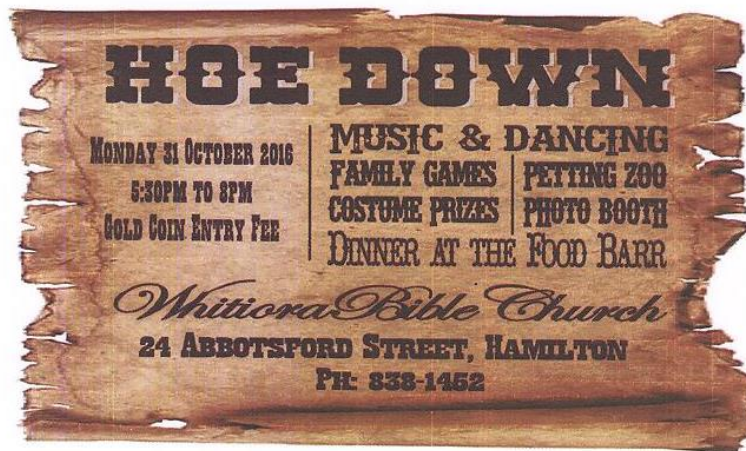

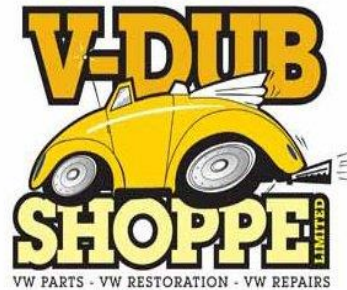

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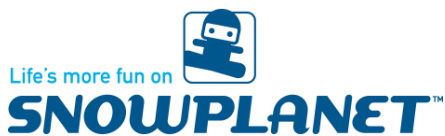
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
